




HIGHLIGHTS:

The U.S. Embassy in Bridgetown coordinates Education USA advising throughout the Eastern Caribbean. Top fields of academic interest for students from Antigua are accounting, finance, management, and education.

In addition to academic study, students are interested in sports and professional experiences, such as practicums and internships.

Suggested ways to increase student mobility between Antigua and the United States include articulation agreements with institutions that offer associate degree programs (business and hospitality training) and professional certification (nursing and pharmacy); teacher education; capacity building for educators, including online programs with onsite training during summer vacation; technical and vocational education and training (TVET).

Financial resources available include Board of Education Annual Grant, Prime Minister Scholarship Initiative, Island Scholar; and several private sector scholarships for persons within certain industries. There is also a National Student Loan Fund. Public sector workers maintain employment and salary while pursuing full-time study.

Structure of University System

- Years of study required to earn a bachelor's degree: The Antigua State College offers one three-year bachelor's degree program through the department of undergraduate studies in the faculties of humanities, social sciences, and science and technology; however, degrees are not issued by ASC. Associate degree programs are two years in length. Certificate programs are 12 months.
- Language of instruction in universities: English
- Years of required English instruction in universities: All
- Grading system and interpretation: 4.0 scale GPA
- **Degrees offered:** Antigua State College offers associate degree programs, certificate programs, and bachelor's degree programs. These programs ("Levels 1 and 2") are through an agreement with the University of the West Indies.
- Top fields of study/majors: Business (accounting, finance, management) and education
- Standardized graduate admissions testing availability / frequency offered in-country: GRE iBT Home Edition offered at one testing center. GMAT not currently offered in country

- **Study Abroad:** The United States is the number one study abroad destination for Antiguan students. While there are a few offshore U.S. universities in Antigua, most students must travel to complete their undergraduate studies as transfers.





HIGHLIGHTS:

For more than 22 years, Argentina has invested in building educational partnerships to attract U.S. students and scholars. Even though the number of U.S. students studying in Argentina declined by 42.1 percent due to the pandemic, Argentina went from the 23rd to the 18th top receiver worldwide of U.S. study abroad students.

In 2021, the U.S. Embassy inaugurated a new EducationUSA center inside the Catholic University of Buenos Aires (UCA) which, in addition to offering student advising, can help facilitate institutional partnerships between Argentine and U.S. HEIs.

Despite the 10 percent decrease in Argentine students studying in the U.S. due to the pandemic, more students are participating in EducationUSA programs, such as webinars and advising cohorts (i.e., the Competitive College Club). Argentina had the third largest number of students in the WHA region who participated in the 2021 EducationUSA LLM webinar series.

The country is undergoing high inflation rates that were aggravated by the pandemic. The Ministry of Education website provides a platform called Campus Global, where all countries can list study abroad programs and recruit interested Argentine students.

Secondary Education (high school)

- Language of instruction: Spanish
- Years of mandatory English courses: 7
- **Grading system and interpretation:** 1 to 10 (A=9-10; B=7-8; C=5-6; D=4; F=1-3). The passing grade for secondary school is 7 (in all subjects), and usually students must take a final exam (*Integrador*), for which 6 is the passing grade.
- **Subjects required:** The required subjects for each student depend on the program track: economics, natural sciences, social sciences, visual arts, and humanities. Thirteen possible subjects are math, Spanish, English (ESL), physics, biology, physical education, history, geography, literature, computing, arts, philosophy, and law.
- **Graduation requirements:** Students need a minimum passing grade of 6 or 7 in all subjects, depending on the school. At the end of the year, students take a final exam (*Integrador*), for which the minimum passing grade is 6.
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: Bachiller or Tecnico
- Name of school leaving exams: Examenes Finales / Integradores
- How to verify school leaving exams or diploma/certificate/degree: In December, each student receives a certificate
 of completion (Certificado de Titulo en Tramite) and a report card. In March, they receive the final transcript and
 diploma.
- Other credentials: N/A
- Standardized undergraduate admissions testing availability in-country and adviser recommendations: Most students sit for Cambridge exams, such as the FCE, CAE, or CPE. There is a strong tendency to learn British English. TOEFL (12 times per month) and IELTS (4 times per month) are offered in most cities. SAT (5 times per year) and ACT (5 times per year) are offered in Buenos Aires.
- Standardized undergraduate admissions test mean scores (as of 2020): TOEFL: Reading: 23; Listening: 24; Speaking: 22; Writing: 22; Total: 92





HIGHLIGHTS:

The Education USA Aruba advising center opened in October 2020. It is hosted by the Ministry of Education of Aruba at the John F. Kennedy Education Center. This center provides support to Arubans and Curaçaoans.

As reported by Education USA Aruba, the two top areas of student interest are financial resources/scholarships and college athletics.

The Government of Aruba seeks to partner with U.S. higher education institutions offering undergraduate and graduate degrees in priority fields such as education, finance, tourism, and STEM, in hybrid or online education modality.

The Government of Aruba currently supports Aruban students in the United States pursuing studies at higher education institutions with which they have signed MOUs. These agreements allow Aruban students to pay tuition at the in-state rate. They are currently seeking to expand their list of partnerships.

Aruban students have access to loans and scholarships from the Department of Education of Aruba (DEA), which are applicable to cover study abroad expenses.








HIGHLIGHTS:

Bahamas is the second top sending country of students to the United States from the Caribbean region.

Top fields of interest are business administration and STEM.

"Two plus two" programs are becoming more popular among Bahamian students due to the accessibility of this educational model. There is an opportunity for U.S. colleges and universities to establish partnerships with local institutions to develop these programs.

Bahamian students have demonstrated an increased interest in pursuing graduate studies. The Fulbright Foreign Student Program was re-launched in 2019, and it is administered by the U.S. Embassy Nassau.

The new EducationUSA Bahamas advising center at the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (BTVI) is focusing on re-establishing advising services for students, working with high school guidance counselors, and connecting with U.S.-based higher education institutions.

Secondary Education (high school)

- Years of mandatory English courses: All levels require English as part of the curriculum.
- Grading system and interpretation: Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate (CSEC): A-F/100-0
- Subjects required: Physics, general science, biology, health sciences
- Graduation requirements: Official GCSE/GCE O levels or CXC results from Caribbean Examinations Council. The Bahamian school system is based on the British model. In the primary (the first six) grades, students advance depending on their performance on examinations administered at the end of each academic year. In the secondary grades, they take their first major external examination, the National Junior Certificate Examination. To graduate, they must pass the Bahamas General Certificate of Secondary Education (BGCSE).
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: Bahamas General Certificate of Secondary Education (BGCSE)
- Name of school leaving exams: The Bahamas General Certificate of Secondary Education (BGCSE)/GCE O Levels: 5 college level subjects with grade "C" or higher. Before 1993, high school students graduated with a General Certificate of Education (GCE) from the University of London. Since 1993, they have received a Bahamas General Certificate of Secondary Education (BGCSE), which reflects their standing on a seven-point scale of grades ranging from A to G.
- How to verify school leaving exams or diploma/certificate/degree: Ministry of Education
- Other credentials: IB Diploma is offered in three international schools (two in Nassau and one in Freeport).
- Standardized undergraduate admissions testing availability in-country and adviser recommendations: SAT 12 testing centers; ACT six testing centers; TOEFL one testing center

Structure of University System

- Years of study required to earn a bachelor's degree: 4-5 years
- Language of instruction in universities: English
- Years of required English instruction in universities: All
- Grading system and interpretation: Varies by institution Generally six passes, graded C or higher and average of C grades or better. University of the Bahamas uses letter grades and a seven-point maximum grading scale. Grade 'A' is the highest possible grade and grades below 'D' are considered failing. Plus (+) or minus (-) symbols indicate grades that fall above or below the letter grades (but grades 'A+' and 'D-' are not used).
- **Degrees offered:** A.A., B.A., B.Ed. & B.Sc. Local higher education institutions include the University of The Bahamas (now a four-year institution), the regional University of The West Indies, the Bahamas Hotel Training College, and the Bahamas Technical and Vocational Institute (formerly Industrial Training Centre). In addition, students can take classes offered by the University of Miami, Nova Southeastern University, and several other U.S. universities with branch campuses in the Bahamas.



HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2020-2021, Barbados reported an increase in graduate student enrollment in U.S. institutions, as well as short-term, non-degree programs. Top fields of academic interest for Barbadian students are STEM fields (engineering), business & accounting, and social sciences.

The government is prioritizing fields related to the blue economy, the sustainable use of ocean resources for economic growth, and the preservation of the health of the ocean ecosystem.

The Barbados government provides annual merit-based undergraduate scholarships to 20-30 students who receive very high scores on the Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Examinations and BCC Associate Degree Program.

Aside from academics, many students are interested in athletics. Barbadian track and field continues to grow, and the country's talented student-athletes are worthy of recruiters' attention. 



HIGHLIGHTS:

With the full support of the Belize Ministry of Education, EducationUSA Belize services the Belize District, with the largest secondary and post-secondary populations in the country.

In its immediate vicinity, five of the 14 high schools and post-secondary institutions in Belize City are within reach of EducationUSA. EducationUSA Belize is located in Belize's largest public library, the Leo Bradley Library.

EducationUSA is a gateway to new programs of study that are not available in Belize such as master's degrees in nursing and psychology, and countless undergraduate degree programs not available at the two universities located in Belize: The University of Belize (UB) and the University of the West Indies Open Campus (UWI-BZ).

EducationUSA Belize reports steady interest from the public in financial planning, scholarships, and graduate studies. Open Doors showed a 23.7 percent increase in graduate student enrollments from Belize.

Belize continues to be a top destination for U.S. study abroad and faculty-led programs with more than 1,000 students focusing on environmental studies, anthropology, and archeology, annually.




Bolivian Students Studying in the U.S.

HIGHLIGHTS:

The Bolivian government has a scholarship program called "Soberania" for graduate studies in the STEM fields at top international universities. EducationUSA advisers in Bolivia work with students who are interested in applying to study in the United States through this government program. The scholarship covers all costs, including, in some cases, local costs of language preparation. In October 2021, the government launched a new application process and included, for the first time, eligibility for undergraduate programs in the areas of nuclear engineering and nuclear physics.

English continues to be a barrier for students to study in the United States. Most Bolivians study English at local institutes. Binational centers called CBAs have a strong reputation for English teaching in the country. CBAs also house four of the five EducationUSA centers in Bolivia. Bolivians are interested in short-term English programs in the U.S. that can help them perfect their language skills.

Many students choose Arkansas as a destination due to its in-state tuition agreement for Bolivians.

Secondary Education (high school)

- Years of mandatory English courses: English teaching depends on the school. Private schools usually establish English language programs that span throughout the twelve years of school instruction. In addition, the new Education Law enables each Department (State) to choose the foreign language to be taught in all of the Department's schools. English is the foreign language of choice in many public schools of Bolivia. In La Paz, specifically, English is taught in all schools.
- Grading system and interpretation: The school year is now divided into four bimesters of two and a half months each. At the end of each bimester, students are graded on a scale from 0 to 100. The lowest passing grade is 51. The equivalents between the Bolivian and the U.S. systems are approximately the following: 85-100 = A; 69-84 = B; 60-68 = C; 51-59 = D; 0-50=F. Because of COVID-19, the 2020 school year was canceled in August 2020, three months ahead of time. All students automatically passed their grade by governmental decree. To provide grades for the missing trimester, the Ministry of Education decided to grant each student similar grades they received during the same period in 2019. During 2021, school activities resumed online and there were no interferences with grading.
- **Subjects required:** Please note that the list below details only the subjects that students are required to study in the last four years of high school. Depending on the school, there may be additional courses: communication and languages, foreign language, history, geography and civics, physical education and sports, Music, visual and plastic arts, mathematics, chemistry, physics, natural or biological sciences, values and spirituality, philosophy and psychology, somputer science.
- **Graduation requirements:** To graduate from high school, all students must complete all twelve years of mandatory school instruction.
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: Titulo de Bachiller
- Name of school leaving exams: There are no standard leaving exams.
- How to verify school leaving exams or diploma/certificate/degree: While there are no standard leaving exams in Bolivia, please contact SEDUCA (www.minedu.gob.bo) or EducationUSA for more information about local exams and other graduation requirements.
- Other credentials: Recently, a few private schools have begun offering IB programs. Other private schools, in which the primary instruction language is English, give exit examinations. These may vary per school but may include TOEFL-ITP and TOEFL-IBT examinations.
- Standardized undergraduate admissions testing availability in-country and adviser recommendations: SAT, ACT, and TOEFL available. IELTS is not offered in country.






Despite the 16% decrease from last year, Brazil moved from the #9 to the #8 top sender worldwide of international students to the United States.

Pontes Americanas (American Bridges), an initiative of the offices of EducationUSA and American Spaces in Brazil, is a network of 655 Brazilian "Federal Institute" campuses to which EducationUSA provides frequent information on study opportunities in the United States that are shared with over one million students across Brazil.

The Embassy's English Language Office and Education USA together launched the Essay Writing Resource Center, with online tutorials, currently used by 8,500 students.

Three new EducationUSA centers opened in Brazil in 2021 (in Acre, Minas Gerais, and Rondonia).

Dual high school diplomas offered by several Brazilian high schools in partnership with U.S. high schools, are creating new pools of students to study in the U.S.

EducationUSA advisers are supporting international universities to submit partnership proposals with U.S. HEIs for the 100K Strong Brazil-focused competition.

- **Subjects required:** New reforms will be governed by the Base Nacional Comum Curricular which will define the core curriculum and the required disciplines in five areas: Languages and technology, mathematics and technology, natural sciences and technology, applied human and social sciences, and technical and professional formation. Subjects in the core curriculum are: Portuguese, literature, mathematics, physics, chemistry, biology, geography, history, sociology, philosophy, physical education, art, and English, Spanish, or French. Some schools offer German or Mandarin. Federal Institutes also require students to undergo professional certification programs.
- **Graduation requirements:** Successful completion of three years of high school (or equivalent Supletivo (GED) most schools establish 6.0 to 7.0 (on a scale of 0-10), as a passing grade.
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: Certificado de Ensino Médio / Certificado de Conclusão do 2º Grau. If students complete the last year of high school overseas as part of an exchange program, the local secretariat of education is responsible for issuing a statement verifying high school completion. 






HIGHLIGHTS:

Canada is the fourth largest sending country of international students to the United States.

Opportunities for recruiting Canadian students include: specialized programs (health, business, law, fine arts); short-term programs; graduate degrees; internships; and institutional cooperation at the technical education level

Canadian athletes are the second largest student population in the NCAA, after Americans.

Canadian higher education institutions continue to think strategically about sustainable pathways for student mobility through institutional linkages. Consortium-like working groups support these efforts, such as the Ontario Academic Exchanges working group.

Francophone Canadian institutions are interested in strategic partnerships with community and technical colleges. In particular, the CEGEP system is dedicated to establishing more academic exchanges.

EducationUSA Canada has expanded its footprint by opening two new centers in Toronto and Vancouver.





HIGHLIGHTS:

The 10.3 percent decrease in students from Chile to the United States was expected due to the suspension of the Chilean graduate foreign government scholarship program *Becas Chile*. However, the number of students in EducationUSA Chile cohort advising groups doubled (likely in response to recent past periods of political unrest and changes to the secondary education system), creating more pipelines to U.S. higher education.

Chile's president-elect, Gabriel Boric, presented his ministerial cabinet that will start in March 2022. Fourteen out of the 24 new ministers are women, and several are alumni of U.S. higher education institutions. Chile is in the process of rewriting their constitution. In January 2022, the Chilean Ministry of Education unveiled a new college entrance exam that will evaluate students twice a year, emphasizing competencies and skills. Due to many changes and insecurities, some Chilean families are opting to send their children to study abroad.

Chile experienced a 58.2 percent decrease in U.S. students at Chilean universities due to the pandemic. While the numbers dropped sharply, Chile is still the 24th largest receiving country of U.S. study abroad students.

- **Graduation requirements:** To receive a high school diploma, students must pass each grade level with a minimum grade of 4 and have at least an 85 percent attendance record.
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: Licenciatura de Enseñanza Media
- Name of school leaving exams: There is no national school leaving exam. In January 2022, the Chilean Ministry of Education (MoE) presented the new Higher Education Access Test (PAES) that replaces the past PSU exam for college entrance examination. The test will be administered twice beginning in 2022, in July and again at the end of the year (date TBD). The math portion will be divided into two parts: a compulsory part for all careers (Mathematical Competence 1), which will measure the general and transversal competencies that are needed in all university studies, and an elective part (Mathematical Competence 2), for scientific careers (i.e., in STEM) with more intensive use of Math. The current assessment scale (150-850 points) will be replaced by a new scale of 100 (minimum) to 1,000 (maximum) points. Other changes in the new application system will allow students with high academic performance to apply to universities in Chile regardless of the average score on standardized tests. This change should allow universities in Chile to expand access to students from every corner of the country.








HIGHLIGHTS:

- Colombia continues to rank in the top 25 countries of origin for international students in the United States (ranking nineteenth).
- The most popular fields of study are STEM-related programs. EducationUSA Colombia organizes an annual fair to connect U.S. higher education institutions with students interested in studying STEM-related fields.
- According to Open Doors, approximately 49 percent of Colombians studying in the United States study at the top five receiving states listed in this report.
- The Colombian Foundation, COLFUTURO, offers scholarship-loans to qualified Colombian graduate students to study abroad, and it is a popular source of funding for Colombians seeking to study in the United States.
- The Colombian Government has supported academic mobility between Colombia and the United States, providing generous funding of over USD \$1 million through the 100,000 Strong in the Americas Innovation Fund, leading to an increase in institutional partnerships.






Costa Rican Students Studying in the U.S.

HIGHLIGHTS:

Costa Rica continues to be the top receiving country of U.S. study abroad students in all the Americas with nearly 4,000 students. U.S. Embassy San José has published a directory of US-Costa Rica Study Abroad programs on their website, which include university-supported programs and third-party providers.

The Costa Rica-USA (CRUSA) Foundation has a scholarship program to send graduating high school seniors to community colleges to pursue technical degrees in STEM. At the graduate level, the U.S. Embassy offers the Fulbright and Fulbright LASPAU programs as funding possibilities.

In 2021, EducationUSA Costa Rica supported four Opportunity Funds students who were admitted with full funding to U.S. colleges and universities to pursue doctoral programs.

There is high interest in workforce development in emerging markets such as services, manufacturing, life sciences, and specialized technical fields.







HIGHLIGHTS:

The U.S. Embassy in Bridgetown coordinates EducationUSA advising throughout the Eastern Caribbean. The Embassy works closely with the Ministry of Education and Human Resource Development (host of the EducationUSA advising center) and American Corner. Local secondary schools and the Dominica State College are supportive of the EducationUSA network, academic programming, and U.S. government exchange programs.

The government of Dominica has increased efforts to establish MOUs and articulation agreements with foreign governments. It has established agreements with five U.S. higher education institutions and is interested in pursuing more partnerships.

The Ministry of Education and Human Resource Development offers scholarships to local students in areas of critical economic importance. Exceptional students from predominately low-income rural areas are prioritized for consideration. To access funding for outof-state tertiary study, students must first complete their associate's degree at the Dominica State College.





HIGHLIGHTS:

The Dominican Republic is the third largest sending country of international students from the Caribbean to the United States.

Top fields of academic interest for Dominican students are education, business administration, engineering, tourism and hospitality, music, and computer science.

The Ministry of Higher Education, Science and Technology (MESCyT) funds a scholarship program for Dominican undergraduate and graduate students to study abroad and online, including in the United States. MESCyT also sponsors the English Immersion Program, which allows Dominican students to increase their language proficiency in-country.

Additional opportunities for research and innovation are available as well. Inicia Educación is a program that supports leadership development in the Dominican Republic's education sector. The program is designed to support Dominican students pursuing graduate studies at U.S. higher education institutions. The ICDA Center for Teachers' Professional Development is another institution that supports educational exchanges.





HIGHLIGHTS:

Ecuador was already experiencing an economic recession prior to the pandemic. Students' ability to funds studies abroad was further affected by COVID-19's impact on the local economy. Students continue to be interested in studying abroad but are looking for more affordable options and substantial financial aid. Online and hybrid programs have become popular as students are interested in flexible programs that can meet their current financial needs.

Ecuador continues to be a leading destination for Americans interested in studying abroad. Because of the pandemic, there was a large decrease of students traveling to Ecuador. The Ecuadorian government is investing in attracting tourists back to the country, including educational tourism. Its high COVID-19 vaccination rates make it a safer study abroad destination.

EducationUSA Ecuador expanded by 150% in 2021. Two new EducationUSA centers opened in the cities of Ambato and Cuenca, and EducationUSA signed an agreement to open a second center in Guayaquil. With this expansion, EducationUSA hopes to increase its reach outside the two largest cities of Quito and Guayaquil and better service students in medium-sized cities.



HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2020-2021, the increase in graduate and optional practical training (OPT) enrollments in U.S. institutions demonstrates a growing trend among Salvadoran students.

Through the Salvadoran American Scholarship Program, the U.S. embassy and Education USA supported 27 students to participate in internships, short-term programs, and graduate studies in the United States in 2021.

There is high interest in short-term exchanges with local higher education institutions to guarantee the possibility of transferring credits in both directions.

Local workforce development is a priority for El Salvador in the following fields: business administration, economics, education (especially English teaching development), engineering (industrial, electrical, mechanical, civil, and software), health-related sciences. and biology.

El Salvador continues to be a top destination for U.S. students studying abroad in the region.






Guatemalan Students Studying in the U.S.



HIGHLIGHTS:

Honduras leads Central America steadily as the number one country in sending international students to the United States.

Top fields of academic interest for Honduran students are STEM, health sciences, business administration, social sciences, and fine and applied arts.

The slight increase in 2020-2021 in graduate student enrollment from Honduras demonstrates a trend of growing interest in U.S. graduate degrees.







Mexico ranks ninth worldwide in sending international students to the United States.

On the hosting side, Mexico ranks twelfth worldwide, as a study abroad destination for U.S. students.

Top fields of academic interest of Mexican students in the United States are business administration, STEM and health-related sciences, social sciences, and fine and applied arts.

Other programs of interest for Mexican students are academic year abroad, short-term summer/winter programs, professional certificates, ESL programs (4 weeks - 6 months), research opportunities, and internships.

Demand for graduate programs is increasing.

Mexico ranks sixth in sending students to community colleges reflecting interest in affordable, flexible, and professional options for career advancement and workforce development.

While its adoption is voluntary, 4,284 Mexican schools enrolling 52 percent of students have implemented the system as of 2019, and more are expected to join. In SEP's Bachillerato General, students must complete 31 courses in the first four semesters of high school under five main areas of knowledge and competencies: mathematics (4), natural and experimental sciences (8), social sciences (6), humanities (9), and communications (4). Additionally, during the last two semesters, students select a specialized track in which they will complete eight final courses among these five fields.
- Graduation requirements: Completion of courses and credits established by high school system.
- Name of diploma/certificate/degree conferred upon completion: The Certificado de Estudios de nivel medio superior (preparatoria or bachillerato) is the final transcript issued by the secondary school or by the university which dictates the high school curriculum.










Since 2020, the EducationUSA center in Panama has provided advising, information sessions and webinars, and workshops to thousands of students. The center is hosted by City of Knowledge (Ciudad del Saber) and works closely with the U.S. embassy, as well as local government programs such as Senacyt, Panama Bilingüe and IFARHU.



HIGHLIGHTS:

Paraguay had a 32 percent increase in the number of students at U.S. colleges and universities in 2021. despite the pandemic. The Paraguayan foreign government scholarships for graduate programs, Becas Antonio Carlos Lopez (BECAL), added a new online master's scholarship program, making Paraguay the first country to adapt to the new reality in the region, and therefore, sharply increase the number of students attending U.S. higher education institutions (HEIs) virtually. EducationUSA offices have also experienced an 80 percent increase since 2019 of students seeking information on study in the United States. The U.S. Embassy and EducationUSA in Paraguay have been holding online webinars to promote U.S. embassy-driven Fulbright scholarships. In the past year, the Paraguayan government increased Fulbright-CAL government scholarships to the country by nearly 70 percent. The Kansas-Paraguay Partners of the Americas out-of-state tuition waiver agreements have also contributed to a steady flow of Paraguayan students attending U.S. HEIs in Kansas. Paraguayan EducationUSA advisers provide cohort advising services for students in the Competitive College and Opportunity Funds programs, helping students from diverse backgrounds pursue U.S. higher education opportunities. A new EducationUSA office was inaugurated in early 2022 in Hernandarias.








HIGHLIGHTS:

According to Open Doors, Peru is the only country in the Andean Region of South America that had a stable number of students studying in the United States in 2020-2021 (with a 0.3% increase). This positive development is likely due to an increase in institutional partnerships and Peruvian students' flexibility to begin their studies online while travel restrictions were in place.

PRONABEC, Peru's government agency for scholarship programs, funds graduate education in the United States through the "Beca Generacion del Bicentenario." The scholarship covers master's and doctoral studies in STEM, public policy, and education.

The Government of Peru has built elite public high schools called "Colegios de Alto Rendimiento" across the country to educate the best students in Peru, regardless of their economic background, with intensive English training and International Baccalaureate curriculum. EducationUSA advisers work closely with these schools ensuring students receive regular advising and information about studies in the U.S.





The Embassy works closely with the Ministry of Education, National Reconciliation, Ecclesiastical Affairs and Information, the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Community College, and the St. Vincent Public Library, which hosts the EducationUSA advising center.

The Vincentian Government does not presently have any established MOUs or articulation agreements with any U.S. higher education institutions. However, the government does provide national scholarships (covering five years of study) and "exhibitions" (covering three years of study) to qualified students wishing to pursue their studies overseas. The recipients of these awards are determined by a cabinet under the advice of the Ministry of Education, and the total number of awardees varies annually between 10 to 15. 




Trinidadian Students Studying in the U.S.



HIGHLIGHTS:

EducationUSA Uruguay has experienced increased interest and participation in cohort advising, receiving a higher number of applications for the Competitive College Club and Opportunity Funds Program than in past years. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there was a 12.8% decrease in Uruguayan students studying in the United States. However, the number of undergraduate students only dropped by 0.5%, corroborating the higher cohort numbers EducationUSA has experienced. In response to the pandemic. Education USA devised online outreach visits to expand awareness of study abroad services including virtual school visits that significantly increased country-wide reach. Advisers plan virtual classes in collaboration with American Spaces, where students tour college campuses, improve their vocabulary, and expand awareness of U.S. higher education in six cities.

The government of Uruguay has incorporated the teaching of English and technology into the public-school curriculum at all levels and has become a strong contributor to Fulbright academic programs, with master's and Ph.D. scholarships in biotechnology, health, energy, agro-industry and food chain development, natural resources, and information and communication technologies.



HIGHLIGHTS:

- Venezuela is the 21st sender worldwide of international students to the United States. It remains in the top 25 sending countries despite the current economic environment and difficulties obtaining student visas related to the closure of the U.S. Embassy in Caracas. Though numbers will likely continue to decrease, Venezuelan students interested in studying in the U.S. continue to pursue their goal.
- As Covid-19 continues to impact Venezuela, advisers continue to offer services virtually. Even though Venezuela suffers from regular electricity and internet disruptions, students from across the country find ways to participate in the extensive selection of virtual programing offered by EducationUSA centers. Social media engagement, such as Instagram Live, has become a very popular way to connect with audiences during the pandemic.
- In spite of Covid-19 restrictions, EducationUSA Venezuela expanded in 2021 by opening a new center in Valencia. This center will focus on helping students in the Carabobo State in central Venezuela.
